The <u>Department of Energy</u> stated that as of 2015, all new central AC systems in the Southeast must have a seasonal energy efficiency ratio (SEER rating) of 14 or

higher. These stricter requirements mean that, even though a new system is a major investment, you'll see immediate savings on your cooling costs when you get it installed.
